# 1. Introduction

### **About this report**

- 1.1 In July 2007 Glasgow Community Planning Partnership Ltd commissioned ODS Consulting and MRUK to conduct a survey of 10,000 households in Glasgow to establish residents' views, perceptions and expectations of issues relating to their neighbourhoods.
- 1.2 This report gives the findings of the survey work undertaken in the West Local Community Planning Partnership (LCPP). There are ten LCPPs in Glasgow and, as such, this report is one of a suite of ten. The reports are accompanied by an overview report which looks at the survey results for the whole of Glasgow.
- 1.3 Data presented in output tables have been rounded to whole numbers as such percentage totals may not equal 100 per cent.

# **Background to the study**

- 1.4 The quality of the neighbourhood we live in can have a significant impact on our self-esteem and well-being. It also affects how others perceive us which, in turn can have indirect consequences on the quality of our lives, for instance, in our ability to secure employment. It is therefore no coincidence that there is a direct correlation between neighbourhood quality and the relative concentration of deprivation.
- 1.5 Improving neighbourhood management is a tool that has been used across the UK to try and address social exclusion. It covers a wide spectrum of activities, from the work of neighbourhood wardens, caretakers and housing managers, to broader approaches such as service decentralisation and improved means of local governance.
- 1.6 The Glasgow Community Planning Partnership (CPP) brings key public, private, community and voluntary representatives together with the aim of delivering better, more joined-up public services in the City. Ten Local Community Planning Partnerships (LCPP) have been established which have





- co-terminus boundaries with a range of other service providers. They are also aligned with 56 neighbourhoods.
- 1.7 Glasgow Housing Association (GHA) is the largest social landlord in Glasgow with around 70,000 houses. There is a significant correlation between concentrations of its housing stock and the most deprived neighbourhoods in the city. Its most recent tenant survey published in March 2007 found a high proportion of tenants to be satisfied with the organisation and the services it provides. However, the survey did underline concerns amongst tenants about the maintenance of common access areas. Ongoing problems in neighbourhood management were identified as a result of groups of young people 'hanging around', noisy neighbours, vandalism and graffiti, drug/alcohol abuse, unkempt open spaces, abandoned vehicles, litter and rubbish.
- 1.8 The CPP intends to address these issues by implementing a Neighbourhood Management Initiative across the city. This will extend the Pathfinder Initiative undertaken last year in the North East LCPP. The CPP has therefore commissioned a survey of 10,000 households to establish residents' views, perceptions and expectations of issues relating to their neighbourhoods.

# The West area

- 1.9 The West Local Community Planning Partnership (LCPP) area has a population of 56,987 people, representing just under ten per cent of the total city population. The area includes the neighbourhoods of:
  - Yoker and Scotstoun;
  - Knightswood;
  - Temple and Anniesland;
  - Blairdardie; and
  - Drumchapel.
- 1.10 Nearly half of the local population (49%) live in a Data Zone among the 10 per cent most deprived neighbourhoods in Scotland as defined by the Scotlish Index of Multiple Deprivation (SIMD). Furthermore, 22 of the area's 71 Data





Zones fall into the bottom five per cent most deprived –17,800 people or 31 per cent of the local population live in these neighbourhoods.

- 1.11 The SIMD demonstrates that income, employment, health and housing deprivation are key issues for the West. Higher proportions of residents live in a bottom 15 per cent ranked Data Zone for these elements compared to Glasgow as a whole.
- 1.12 The SIMD evidence shows that income is an issue in the local area. Fifty-seven per cent of the population (32,300 people) live in the worst 15 per cent of income deprived Scottish Data Zones. Employment is also a key issue for the area with nearly two-thirds of residents (65% or 37,100) living in one of the 15 per cent worst employment deprived neighbourhoods. Sixty-three per cent of local residents (35,800) live in a bottom 15 per cent health deprived Data Zone which is also above the Glasgow average.
- 1.13 Housing deprivation is also an issue in the local area with three-quarters of residents (42,500) living in a bottom 15 per cent housing deprived neighbourhood. Fifty-two of the 71 Data Zones are in the worst 15 per cent which is the highest concentration for any individual domain. However, this may be due to the high level of tenemental properties in the area which may skew the over-crowding indicator used in the housing domain.
- 1.14 Drugs and alcohol appear to be serious issues for some sections of the local community. Twelve local Data Zones had drugs related emergency hospital admission rates above the Glasgow average. Fifteen Zones had levels of alcohol related hospital admissions that were above the city average.
- 1.15 Crime statistics show that the rate of crimes and offences locally is just twothirds the city average. However, rates of housebreaking and vandalism crime were closer to the city norm.





# 2. Methodology

- 2.1 The survey was designed to present residents' views, perceptions and requirements at a neighbourhood level in three key areas:
  - security (control of nuisance and general supervision);
  - environmental (maintenance and repair of damage to public areas); and
  - cleansing (street cleaning, refuse collection and rubbish removal).
- 2.2 The questionnaire was developed in consultation with representatives from Glasgow Community Planning Partnership, Glasgow Housing Association, the Community Health and Care Partnerships and Strathclyde Police. The survey questionnaire is included as Appendix One.
- 2.3 One thousand interviews were undertaken in each of ten LCPP areas.
- 2.4 We aimed to make the survey as representative as possible by speaking to sufficient numbers of participants in a range of key demographic groups.
  Targets were agreed in advance with Glasgow Community Planning
  Partnership. The results are shown in Table 2.1 below:

2.5 As the table shows each of the targets for the key demographics were closely met (+/- 4%) during the survey field work with the exception of 'economically inactive'. People who are 'economically inactive' may be underrepresented in the survey.





# 3. Study Findings – Overall Analysis


3.1 This chapter describes the findings of the overall analysis of the residents' survey from all five neighbourhoods as well as providing a summary of key findings.

# **Security and Community Safety**

3.2 Residents were asked a number of questions concerning security and community safety issues in their neighbourhood. For each question, they were asked to rate the issue as either 'not a problem at all', 'not much of a problem', 'problem' or 'serious problem'. The results are shown in Figure 3.1.

# **Most significant issues**

3.3 The survey highlights a number of issues that were viewed as problems by a substantial minority of residents. The most significant concerns were 'youth disorder', 'street drinking', 'vandalism and graffiti', 'dogs roaming, dog fouling, and barking', and 'road safety'. There were also comparatively high levels of concern about 'noisy neighbours / parties' and 'drug / alcohol / substance abuse'.

# **Noisy neighbours / parties**

3.4 This was not one of the main issues for the residents but was considered to be a 'problem' by six per cent (56 people). A further three per cent (27 people) said that this was a 'serious problem'.





#### Youth disorder

3.5 Youth disorder was the third most significant issue for the respondents. Nine per cent (121 people) said that it was a 'problem' with a further five per cent (50 people) stating that it was a 'serious problem'.

## Street drinking

3.6 Seven per cent of respondents (72 people) felt that street drinking was a 'problem' and a further three per cent (29 people) said that it was a 'serious problem'.

# Drug, alcohol and substance misuse

3.7 Drug, alcohol and substance misuse were viewed as more of a problem than other issues. Six per cent (58 people) said that it was a 'problem' and a further three per cent (30 people) said that it was a 'serious problem'.

# Vandalism and graffiti

3.8 Vandalism and graffiti was viewed as the fourth most significant problem in the area. Seven per cent of respondents (74 people) said that vandalism and graffiti was a 'problem'. Five per cent (53 people) said that it was a 'serious problem'.

#### Dogs roaming, dog fouling and barking

3.9 Dog roaming / fouling / barking was the issue that the highest percentage viewed as a problem in the local area. Twelve per cent (120 people) felt that this was a 'problem' and a further six per cent (55 people) stated that it was a 'serious problem'.

# **Road safety**

- 3.10 Road safety was the second biggest concern for local residents. Thirteen per cent (132 people) said that road safety was a 'problem' and a further three per cent (26 people) stated that it was a 'serious problem' in the local area.
- 3.11 The 158 respondents who stated that road safety was either a 'problem' or 'serious problem' were asked what their particular concerns were in relation to the issue. The results are shown in Table 3.2.

- 3.12 For those concerned about road safety by far the most significant issue was 'cars driving too fast' with 85 per cent of respondents (135 people) giving this response. Forty-one per cent (64 people) were concerned about drivers using the streets in the area as a 'rat run'.
- 3.13 Thirteen per cent of respondents felt that there are too many parked cars on both sides of the road and there was some concern about the poor condition of local roads (10%).

## Safety of children

- 3.14 A small proportion of respondents felt that the safety of children was an issue in the local area. Six per cent of respondents (63 people) felt that this was a 'problem' and one per cent (12 people) felt it was a 'serious problem'.
- 3.15 The 75 respondents who stated that safety of children was either a 'problem' or 'serious problem' were asked what their particular concerns were in relation to the issue. The results are shown in Table 3.3 below.

3.16 Most of the respondents (91%) said that 'danger on the roads' was the greatest issue for children's safety. The risk of becoming involved in drug use was a concern (17%) as was the danger of encountering violence (12%). There was less concern about the physical environment including building works and derelict buildings.





# Less significant issues

- 3.17 Overall, 'racial harassment' and 'house break-ins / burglary' were considered less of a problem than other areas of community safety. Ninety-six per cent of respondents (957 people) said that racial harassment was either 'not much of a problem' or 'not a problem at all' while only two per cent (16 people) said that it was a 'problem' or 'serious problem' in the local area.
- 3.18 Other issues that were not viewed as significant problems in the local area were: 'verbal abuse', 'drug dealing', 'harassment', 'personal safety and security' and 'vehicle break-ins / theft', all with less than five per cent of respondents stating that these issues were either a 'problem' or 'serious problem'.

#### **Number of concerns**

3.19 As Table 3.4 shows more than half of the respondents (57% - 574 people) felt that none of the issues were a 'problem' or 'serious problem' in their neighbourhood. Nine per cent (91 people) said that five or more of the issues were either a 'problem' or 'serious problem'. Fourteen per cent (143 people) felt that one of the issues was a problem locally.

# Changes in community safety in the past year

3.20 Residents were asked to consider the same issues relating to community safety and were encouraged to state whether they have got worse, stayed the same or got better in the past year. For each question, they were asked to rate the issue as either being 'much worse', 'slightly worse', 'slightly better', or 'much better'. The results are shown in Figure 3.2.






3.21 For each of the issues the most common response was that the problem had stayed 'the same' in the last year. As the size of the scale in Figure 3.2 indicates, only small percentages of respondents stated that the issues had got either better or worse. The issue for which the most people felt there had been a change was 'dog roaming / fouling / barking' where 14 per cent (139 people) said that it had got better or worse. The remaining 86 per cent either said that it has stayed the same or did not answer the question. For the issue of racial harassment just three per cent (28 people) felt that there had been a change in the previous year. On average, for each issue only six per cent felt that there had been a notable change for better or worse.

# Change for the worse

3.22 Where there were comments that an issue has changed, the majority of responses were 'negative' with most issues being characterised as having got worse in the previous year. Comparatively, the most negative responses came in relation to: 'dogs roaming / fouling / barking'; 'youth disorder'; 'road safety'; 'vandalism and graffiti', and 'street drinking'. For each of these issues six per cent or more of respondents felt that the problem had got 'slightly worse' or 'much worse' in the previous year.

# Dog roaming / fouling / barking

3.23 This was the issue that the highest proportion of respondents felt had deteriorated in the past year. Eight per cent (77 people) felt that the problem had got 'slightly worse' in the past year and a further three per cent (34 people) felt that it had got 'much worse'.





#### Youth disorder

3.24 Six per cent of respondents (56 people) felt that the problem of youth disorder had got 'slightly worse' in the previous year and a further four per cent (41 people) said that it had got 'much worse'. Two per cent of respondents felt that the issue had got 'slightly better' in the area.

# **Road Safety**

3.25 The problem of road safety was considered to have got 'slightly worse' by eight per cent (75 people) and a further two per cent (20 people) felt it had got 'much worse'. Two per cent felt that the problem had got 'slightly better' in the previous year.

### Vandalism and graffiti

3.26 Five per cent of respondents (46 people) felt that vandalism and graffiti had got 'slightly worse' in the area while a further four per cent (38 people) felt that the situation was 'much worse'. However, three per cent of respondents felt that the situation had got 'slightly better' on this issue.

# Street drinking

3.27 Four per cent of respondents (36 people) felt the 'street drinking' had got 'slightly worse' in the past year and a further two per cent (24 people) felt it had got 'much worse'. Two per cent of respondents felt that road safety had improved in the area.

#### Change for the better

3.28 More 'positive' responses came in relation to 'problems with neighbours' and 'noisy neighbours/parties'. There were also some positive comments in relation to 'vandalism / graffiti' and 'dog roaming / fouling / barking'.

#### **Problems with neighbours**

3.29 The most positive view came in relation to 'problems with neighbours' where 22 people (2%) felt that the situation with regard to neighbours had gotten 'slightly better' and one person said that it had got 'much better'. However, two per cent felt that problems with neighbours had got 'slightly worse' in the previous year and a further two per cent stated that it had got 'much worse'.





3.30 There were also positive responses in relation to 'noisy neighbours and parties' with 17 people (2%) stating that things had got 'slightly better' and one person said that it had got 'much better'. However, three per cent felt that the situation had got 'slightly worse' and a further three per cent of respondents felt it had got 'much worse'.

# Vandalism and problems with dogs

- 3.31 Despite larger numbers saying the situation had gotten worse, 26 people (3%) felt that 'vandalism / graffiti' had got 'slightly better' in the previous year and two people felt that it had got 'much better'.
- 3.32 Although a higher percentage felt that the problem had gotten worse, 23 people (2%) said that 'dog roaming / fouling / barking' had got 'slightly better' and five people (1%) said that it had got 'much better'.

#### **Number of concerns**

3.33 As Table 3.6 shows 71 per cent of the respondents (708 people) felt that none of the issues had become 'slightly' or 'much worse' in the past year. Twenty-nine per cent felt that some of the issues had got worse in the previous year and five per cent (50 people) felt that five or more issues had got worse.

- 3.35 Fifteen per cent of respondents said that they had been the victim of one of the forms of anti-social behaviour in the past year. The most common types of anti-social behaviour for the residents to encounter were 'youth disorder' (5%), 'problems with neighbours' (4%), and 'vandalism and graffiti' (4%). Other forms of anti-social behaviour that the residents have been reporting include 'noisy neighbours/parties' (3%), 'damage to property' (3%) and 'dog roaming / fouling / barking' (3%).
- 3.36 Eight-five per cent of the respondents said that they had not been the victim of any of the forms of anti-social behaviour in the previous year.





# **Personal safety**

3.37 The residents were asked how safe they feel walking alone in their neighbourhood after dark.

3.38 A majority of residents (70%) said that they feel safe walking alone after dark. Seven per cent of respondents said that they feel 'fairly unsafe' walking in their neighbourhood after dark and a further nine per cent said that they feel 'very unsafe'. 

- 3.40 Overall, the responses were positive with majorities stating that each of the issues were either 'not a problem at all' or 'not much of a problem'.
  Abandoned vehicles were considered to be the least of a concern with 13 per cent stating that this is 'not much of a problem' and 81 per cent saying it is 'not a problem at all'. Just four per cent considered it a problem.
- 3.41 Eighty-eight per cent of respondents felt that 'fly-tipping / dumping' was either 'not much of a problem' (15%) or 'not a problem at all' (73%).





- 3.42 Of more concern was the issue of 'litter in the street'. Thirteen per cent of respondents (129 people) felt that this was a 'problem' and a further four per cent (38 people) said it was a 'serious problem'.
- 3.43 'Untidy communal areas' was felt to be a 'problem' by nine per cent of respondents (90 people). A further two per cent (21 people) felt that this was a 'serious problem'. The issue of graffiti was also a concern with nine per cent (94 people) stating that it was a 'problem' and two per cent (15 people) stating that it was a 'serious problem'.

#### **Number of concerns**

3.44 As Table 3.10 shows 78 per cent of the respondents (779 people) felt that none of the issues were a problem or serious problem in their neighbourhood. Twenty-two per cent (221 people) felt that some of the issues were a problem and five per cent (46 people) felt that five or more of the issues were a problem.



- 3.48 For most of the elements the respondents were positive about the quality of their neighbourhood. Seventy-six per cent of the respondents said that the overall quality of the area was either 'good' (59%) or 'very good' (17%). The residents were generally positive that the area has attractive buildings, an attractive environment and that the neighbourhood is good for quiet and peaceful places.
- 3.49 The residents were less positive about the quality of children's play areas. Fifteen per cent of respondents (146 people) said that children's play areas are 'poor' in the neighbourhood. A further nine per cent (92 people) said that the play areas are 'very poor'.
- 3.50 Eight per cent of respondents (84 people) said that the parks and open spaces in the area are 'poor' and six per cent (60 people) said that they are 'very poor'. Nearly two thirds of the respondents disagreed and felt that the parks are either 'good' (53% 531 people) or 'very good' (12% 118 people).

#### **Number of concerns**

3.51 As Table 3.13 shows, 72 per cent of the respondents (722 people) felt that none of the elements were either 'poor' or 'very poor' in their neighbourhood. Twenty-eight per cent felt that some of the elements were poor and eight per cent (78 people) felt that five or more of the elements were poor.





- 3.53 This question revealed that respondents were generally happy about the quality of different services provided locally. For rubbish collection, health services (through the local health centre or GP) and public transport, 79 per cent and higher said that the service was either 'good' or 'very good'.
- 3.54 There were mixed views about policing in the local area with seven per cent (70 people) saying that the service was 'poor' and a further four per cent (43 people) stating that policing is 'very poor' in the area. However, 44 per cent (441 people) said that policing was 'good' and 13 per cent (134 people) said it was 'very good'.
- 3.55 The respondents were least positive about youth and leisure services. Nine per cent of the residents (86 people) felt that the service was 'poor' and a further five per cent (53 people) said it was 'very poor'. Thirty-eight per cent (380 people) said that youth and leisure services were 'good' and nine per cent said the service was 'very good' (85 people).

#### **Public transport**

3.56 Those who had stated that public transport was poor (52 people) were asked what the particular issues were that concerned them. The results are shown in Table 3.15.

3.62 For the majority of services only small percentages had ever reported a problem. However, ten per cent of respondents had reported a problem to the police. While three per cent said that they had been 'dissatisfied' or 'very dissatisfied' with the response, six per cent said that they were 'satisfied' or 'very satisfied'.





- 3.63 Eight per cent of respondents had reported a problem to Glasgow City Council. While four per cent were satisfied with the response they received, three per cent were dissatisfied. Six per cent had reported a problem to the Glasgow Housing Association – three per cent were satisfied with the response while two per cent were dissatisfied.
- 3.64 The residents were asked if they had ever experienced problems but not reported them to a service provider and if so, why they hadn't reported the problem.

3.70 Eighty-seven per cent of respondents (875 people) said that they were satisfied with the area as a place to live. Of these, forty-two per cent of respondents said that they were 'very satisfied'. Six per cent of residents (58 people) said that they were dissatisfied with the area – and just less than half of these said that they were 'very dissatisfied'.

3.72 A majority of respondents (66%) felt that the area had not changed in the past two years. More people felt that the area had deteriorated than felt it had improved. Fifteen per cent (147 people) said that it had got 'slightly worse' and six per cent (56 people) felt that it had got 'much worse'. Nine per cent (88 people) said that the area had improved slightly and one per cent (9 people) said that it had got 'much better'. Three per cent of respondents either didn't give a view or hadn't lived in the area long enough to comment.

- 3.76 The most common response to this question was to put 'more police on the street' (27% –269 people). A significant proportion (22%) did not want to change anything and 11 per cent didn't have a clear view on what they would change.
- 3.77 Concerns about road safety were expressed by eight per cent of respondents (82 people) who would like to see 'more speed restrictions on the roads'. Six per cent (59 people) said that they would like to see measures to 'reduce youth misbehaviour'.
- 3.78 Four per cent (39 people) said that 'more play areas for younger children' would improve the quality of life in the area and four per cent (42 people) said that cleaner streets would do the same.
- 3.79 Three per cent of respondents (30 people) would like to see measures to evict problem tenants in the local area.





# **Demographics**

3.80 Residents were asked a number of demographic questions about themselves. The totals were then compared against the stratified sample for the area in order to ensure a broad representation of the local community was achieved.

- 3.82 Although there is a good range of age groups represented in the sample, more older people completed the survey than younger people. While 46 per cent of the respondents are people aged over 50 years, 20 per cent of the sample were aged under 30 years.
- 3.83 Any under-representation of younger people, particularly those aged between 16 and 29 may be attributable to several different factors including the fact that younger people were less willing to take part, that they would often defer to their parents to answer the questionnaire, they were more likely to be working and that they were more likely to live in areas with a lower response rate. Conversely, an over-representation of elderly people may be because they were more likely to agree to take part in the survey and because they tended to live in lower density housing areas with a higher response rate.

- 3.90 The vast majority of participants (93% or 927 people) answered 'White Scottish' to the question of ethnic origin, whilst a further one per cent were white and from elsewhere in Britain. Two per cent of respondents were of 'East European' origin.
- 3.91 One per cent of respondents were from a Pakistani ethnic background and one per cent were 'Other Asian'. A further one per cent were of African origin.



# **Involving Local People**

3.96 The survey asked residents to consider how best to involve local people in the community and in neighbourhood management.

### Informing local people

3.97 Respondents were asked to rate how effective they thought different types of information were in terms of informing local people about their neighbourhood, on a scale from 'not effective' to 'very effective'. The results are shown in Figure 3.6.







- 3.98 Respondents were generally positive that 'newsletters' were an effective way to provide information. While six per cent felt that this was ineffective, 48 per cent said that it was 'fairly effective' and 18 per cent said that it was 'very effective'. The residents were also positive about receiving information through public meetings, local housing offices and local advocates / information officers.
- 3.99 The least popular way of providing information was electronically. While 34 per cent of respondents felt that a website would be effective, 11 per cent said that it would not be effective. There was also limited support for email updates while 33 per cent thought this would be effective, 11 per cent disagreed.

### Involvement of local people in decision making

3.100 The residents were asked what level of involvement they think local people should have in making decisions about how the neighbourhood is managed.

3.101 The respondents were clear that local people's views should influence decisions about neighbourhood management but were less supportive of direct control by local people. While 65 per cent (651 people) agreed that 'local people and organisations should be asked their opinions', less than a tenth (9% – 92 people) felt that 'decision-making powers should be only with local people and organisations'.





3.102 Minorities of the respondents felt that local people and organisations should be 'actively involved' (35% – 347 people) or 'equal partners' (17% – 165 people) in making decisions about neighbourhood management. A small proportion (6%) felt that local people should have 'no involvement' in making decisions about how the neighbourhood is managed.

# Collecting feedback from the community

3.103 The residents were asked what they thought would be good ways to collect feedback from the local community.


- 3.104 Nearly half of the respondents (47% 470 people) said that 'regular surveys' are the best way to gather feedback from the community. There was also support for 'regular feedback events' (31% 310 people), 'feedback slips on newsletters' (25% 251 people), 'feedback boards' (23% 231 people) and 'consultation forums' (20% 197 people).
- 3.105 There was less support for gathering feedback through a 'dedicated internet site' (8% 79 people).

#### Involving the local community

3.106 The residents were asked to judge different forms of community involvement, again on a scale 'not effective' to 'very effective'. Figure 3.7 shows the results.







- 3.107 The respondents felt that the most effective forms of community involvement were a 'local organisation to manage the neighbourhood run by local people' and 'community representatives on boards /committees'. Nearly two thirds felt that these options would be effective.
- 3.108 The least popular option was 'attendance at meetings' although views were mixed on this. While 52 per cent thought meetings were effective, ten per cent of respondents thought meetings were either 'not very effective' (9% 85 people) or 'not at all effective' (1% 6 people).





# 4. Study Findings – Area Analyses

- 4.1 This chapter of the report analyses the study findings by neighbourhood. It identifies which issues are the priorities for each of the five areas and which issues are not considered by residents to be as significant. The five areas are:
  - Yoker and Scotstoun;
  - Knightswood;
  - Temple and Anniesland;
  - Blairdardie; and
  - Drumchapel.
- 4.2 Whilst there are some similarities between areas there are also differences which reflect the different characteristics, for example pattern of housing tenure and population demographics.

# **Security and Community Safety**

- 4.3 The findings in Chapter 3 show that the most significant concerns across the wider West LCPP area were 'youth disorder', 'street drinking', 'vandalism and graffiti', 'dogs roaming, dog fouling, and barking', and 'road safety'. There were also comparatively high levels of concern about 'noisy neighbours / parties' and 'drug / alcohol / substance abuse'.
- 4.4 Responses to the survey in Temple / Anniesland and Blairdardie were notably more 'positive' in relation to community safety than other areas. In Blairdardie none of the issues were considered to be a problem by more than a fifth of respondents. In both of these areas problems with dogs and road safety were more of a concern than the other issues.
- 4.5 Youth disorder was one of the main concerns for residents in Yoker / Scotstoun, Knightswood and Drumchapel, although it was not considered the top issue in any of these neighbourhoods. In these three neighbourhoods there were also concerns raised about street drinking. Residents in Blairdardie and Temple / Anniesland showed lower levels of concern about youth disorder and street drinking.





- 4.6 Vandalism and graffiti were significant concerns for residents in Drumchapel and Yoker / Scotstoun but were less of an issue for residents in other neighbourhoods.
- 4.7 Dog roaming / fouling / barking was the top issue for residents living in Yoker / Scotstoun and Temple / Anniesland and was among the main concerns for residents in Blairdardie and Drumchapel. Lower proportions said it was a problem in Knightswood.
- 4.8 Road safety was the top issue for respondents living in Knightswood and Blairdardie and this was the second most serious issue for residents in Temple / Anniesland. Although this was a concern for some residents it was not one of the main issues in Drumchapel and Yoker / Scotstoun.
- 4.9 Drug / alcohol / substance abuse was the top issue for respondents in Drumchapel. This was not emphasised as a significant problem by residents in any of the other four neighbourhoods.
- 4.10 Residents in Knightswood were more concerned about noisy neighbours / parties than any of the other neighbourhoods.
- 4.11 In terms of changes taking place in their local area, residents in Temple / Anniesland, Blairdardie and Yoker / Scotstoun were particularly concerned about worsening problems with dogs.
- 4.12 Deteriorating road safety was the top issue for respondents in Knightswood and this was a serious issue for residents in Blairdardie, Yoker / Scotstoun and to a lesser extent Temple / Anniesland. Residents in Drumchapel did not feel that road safety had deteriorated significantly.
- 4.13 Youth disorder was emphasised as a problem that was getting worse in all of the areas with the exception of Blairdardie.
- 4.14 Residents in Yoker / Scotstoun and Drumchapel were most concerned about increasing levels of vandalism / graffiti. In Blairdardie, 11 per cent said that the situation with vandalism / graffiti was improving.





4.15 Compared with other neighbourhoods, residents in Knightswood were most concerned that noisy neighbours / parties and other problems with neighbours were getting worse locally.

#### **Cleansing and Environment**

- 4.16 Across the West LCPP area litter in the streets was considered the main cleansing and environmental issue. This was followed by untidy communal areas and vandalism and graffiti. Residents were least concerned about abandoned vehicles and fly tipping/dumping.
- 4.17 Reflecting views across the West LCPP, litter in the street was the issue of most concern in each of the five neighbourhoods. Residents living in Drumchapel and Yoker / Scotstoun were particularly concerned about litter.
- 4.18 Untidy communal areas was the second most serious issue in Drumchapel and this was also a concern for residents in Knightswood and Yoker / Scotstoun.
- 4.19 Graffiti was an issue of significant concern in Drumchapel and to a lesser extent in Yoker / Scotstoun and Temple / Anniesland.

#### **Quality of neighbourhood**

- 4.20 The quality of children's play areas was the main concern for residents in all neighbourhoods except Yoker / Scotstoun where a lack of attractive buildings was the main concern. The lack of a quiet and peaceful environment was the second biggest issue for residents in Drumchapel and Yoker / Scotstoun.
- 4.21 Residents in Temple / Anniesland were more critical about the quality of parks / open spaces compared to the other neighbourhoods although this was also an issue for a fifth of residents in Drumchapel.

#### **Quality of service provision**

4.22 The quality of youth and leisure services was the top issue for residents in Temple / Anniesland, Blairdardie and Drumchapel. In Yoker / Scotstoun and Knightswood residents were more concerned about policing in their area.






4.23 Unlike any of the other areas the quality of public transport was the main concern for respondents living in Knightswood.


















# 5. Study Findings – Other

- 5.1 This chapter of the report analyses the study findings by the key demographics of tenure and age group. It identifies which issues are of the greatest priority to residents in each of these key demographics and which are the most popular methods for involving local residents.
- 5.2 There are some substantial differences between demographics that therefore have a direct influence on the results for neighbourhoods and for the entire survey area.

### **Housing Tenure**

5.3 The key issues have been broken down by tenure into residents in housing association properties, private rented and owner-occupiers. These three categories have then been compared to each other and against the entire survey.

## **Security and Community Safety**

- 5.4 The findings in Chapter 3 show that the most significant concerns across the wider West LCPP area were 'youth disorder', 'street drinking', 'vandalism and graffiti', 'dogs roaming, dog fouling, and barking', and 'road safety'. There were also comparatively high levels of concern about 'noisy neighbours / parties' and 'drug / alcohol / substance abuse'.
- 5.5 While road safety was the most serious problem for people living in owneroccupied housing, people living in housing association accommodation did not raise road safety in their top five most serious issues. Road safety was a serious issue for people in private rented housing, as was safety of children.
- 5.6 Problems with youth disorder were the main issue for people living in private rented accommodation. This issue was the third most serious issue for people living in owner-occupied and social rented accommodation.





- 5.7 Dog roaming / fouling / barking was the top issue for people in social rented accommodation and was the second most serious issue for people in owner-occupation. It was less of a problem for people in private rented housing.
- 5.8 Vandalism and graffiti was a concern to housing association tenants but was less of an issue for people in other tenures.

### **Cleansing and Environment**

- 5.9 Across the West LCPP, area litter in the streets was considered the main cleansing and environmental issue. This was followed by untidy communal areas and vandalism and graffiti. Residents were least concerned about abandoned vehicles and fly tipping/dumping.
- 5.10 Litter in the street was the biggest problem for people living in all tenures. Housing association tenants expressed the greatest level of concern on this issue.
- 5.11 Concern about untidy communal areas was most common among housing association tenants and people in owner-occupation. Private renting tenants were slightly more concerned about untidy gardens in their local area. Graffiti was more of an issue for people in social renting compared to the other two tenures.

## Tenure by neighbourhood

- 5.12 The highest rate of social renting was in the Drumchapel area where 66 per cent of survey respondents live in housing association properties. Social renting was also comparatively high in Knightswood (62%) and Yoker / Scotstoun (51%). The lowest level of social renting was in Blairdardie (34%).
- 5.13 Owner-occupation was most common in Blairdardie (64%) and Temple /
  Anniesland (61%). The lowest level of owner-occupation was in Drumchapel (34%).
- 5.14 Private renting was low amongst the survey respondents. The highest rate of private renting was in Yoker / Scotstoun but was only eight per cent. Just two per cent of respondents in Blairdardie lived in private rented accommodation.





## **Involving local people**

- 5.15 Across all three tenures providing information through issuing newsletters was considered the most effective way of keeping local people informed. Providing information through public meetings was considered effective by residents in owner-occupation but was less popular among residents in the other tenures. Providing information in local housing offices and through local advocates / information officers were supported by housing association tenants and owner-occupiers. Private renters preferred the idea of providing information in local health centres.
- 5.16 In terms of community involvement, residents in all tenures were sceptical about the value of attending meetings. This was particularly the case for housing association tenants. Across tenures there was support for a local organisation to manage the neighbourhood run by local people.

#### Age

5.17 For the purposes of comparison, residents have been divided into three groups according to age; under thirty, below retirement age (under 60 for women, under 65 for men); and retirement age. These groups have then been contrasted with regards to key issues.

#### **Security and Community Safety**

- 5.18 Across age groups there was no significant difference in the issues that were identified as problems in relation to security and community safety. However people over retirement age were slightly less likely to say that issues were a problem than the other age groups.
- 5.19 Although dog roaming / fouling / barking was the top issue across age groups, respondents aged under thirty were less likely than the older groups to consider this a problem or serious problem.
- 5.20 Similarly, while road safety was one of the main issues for people of all ages, people aged under thirty were less likely to describe it as a problem in their local area.





#### **Cleansing and Environment**

- 5.21 The different age groups had similar views on the cleanliness of their local area. Litter in the streets was the top issue for all age groups.
- 5.22 Graffiti and untidy communal areas were raised as concerns by residents of all ages. Residents aged under 30 were more likely to state that untidy gardens and dirty stairs / closes were a problem than people in the two older groups.

#### Age by neighbourhood

- 5.23 There were large percentages of respondents aged under thirty in Knightswood (26%) and Yoker / Scotstoun (25%). Drumchapel had the highest proportion of people aged 30 to 59 / 64 with 66 per cent in this group.
- 5.24 Temple / Anniesland had the oldest age profile with the smallest proportion of under 30s (14%) and highest proportion of people of retirement age (26%).


### Involving local people

- 5.25 Newsletters were the most highly rated method of informing local people across all three age groups. There was less support for the use of public meetings among people aged under 30 compared with the two older groups.
- 5.26 The two younger age groups (and particularly the under 30s) were more positive than those of retirement age about the use of email updates and a website to keep the community informed reflecting higher levels of IT literacy.
- 5.27 For all age groups the most popular approaches to community involvement were the presence of community representatives on boards / committees or the establishment of a local organisation run by local people.
