Govan Thriving Place Theme Leads meeting on 19th December 2019

1.0 Welcome and purpose of session.

Councillor Bell welcomed all to the meeting; thanked everyone for all of the hard work to date by the theme groups; and explained that the purpose of today's meeting was to discuss the wider strategy and priorities for Govan Thriving Place.

It was agreed that quarterly meetings between Cllr Bell, Fiona and the theme leads would be helpful. *Action: Fiona to schedule*

2.0 Bringing it all together

2.1 Govan Thriving Place Plan

Councillor Bell outlined the broad content which would include the legislative and strategic context; community engagement process and report; purpose, values and ethos; priorities and outcomes (summary of the theme priorities and the cross cutting priorities and a set of measurable outcomes).

It will also include the processes that we will put in place to deliver the priorities:

- Governance roles, responsibilities, reporting timetable and standard template;
- How each theme measures progress and how we measure progress across the whole of Govan thriving place;
- Resourcing;
- Communications, information sharing, branding, marketing a Govan TP Web site or Portal;
- Annual progress reporting via the Community Conference first one 21st March 2020.

2.2 Group discussion, feedback and suggestions

Govan Thriving Place Plan to be next version of the Govan Locality Plan. *Action: Councillor Bell/Fiona/Jonny Pickering*

A meetings schedule throughout 2020 for the Steering Group and Theme Groups to be agreed that is made available on a Govan TP web site or portal. *Action: Cllr Bell/Fiona/Yvonne Reilly/Theme Leads*

Communications, Marketing, Branding:

Strengthen the identity and visibility of the Govan TP brand and related activities – this should be within the community but also t in the various agencies and services

- that are working and contributing to Govan TP as this will help justify ongoing involvement and commitment. This should include what results are being achieved.
- Link the branding of TP with other emerging initiatives such as the relaunch of Clean Glasgow an associated local campaigns
- Secure expertise to assist with developing a communications/marketing plan and a toolkit to ensure that we have a planned rather than ad hoc approach; secure resources to deliver this plan (possibly using some of the balance from the Community Connector post funding). Agreed that where possible local people and organisations should be commissioned to deliver pieces of work. Build on/complement Yvonne's work as Community Connector and the work of the Building Connections Group
- Use existing avenues e.g. Housing Associations could promote consistent messages via their PR avenues. This could be discussed and agreed at the Steering Group.
- The Building Connections group is developing a Marketing/Branding skills training plan for all involved in Govan Thriving Place

3. Theme Groups and Action Plans – the stories so far, successes and challenges

Govan Positive Communities - Bailie John Kane and Laura Moran

The group is using a different excel format for the action plan to better record and measure progress on mostly operational actions but these still relate back to the agreed strategic priorities and are in response to issues identified by local people. Includes a Red Amber Green (RAG) status for ease of checking. This is an internal mechanism to make it easier to record progress and highlight responsibilities for actions.

Successes:

Community Safety: formation of Anti-Social Behaviour Partnership Group to actively engage with young people through joint street work and activities. Partners involved: GCC Neighbourhoods and Sustainability (N&S), Govan Youth Information Project, Police Scotland, Glasgow and Elderpark Housing Associations, Aberlour and Glasgow Life.

Environmental:

- introduction of Environmental Volunteers for local people to participate in local projects - will be taken forward by Charli Griffin, Glasgow Housing Association;
- program of schools and business clean ups. Provided by GCC N&S;
- Reinvigorating the Neighbourhood Improvement Volunteer scheme in Govan.
- Community Payback has undertaken various environmental clean ups within Govan.
- Distribution of "See something, Say something" cards to encourage reporting of issues.

Challenges: how we demonstrate that this theme and others are adding value to what individual service providers are established to do. Address this in the narrative for the Govan Thriving Place plan and in the theme plans and provide examples (e.g. services focussing resources and staffing in Govan; added dimensions to existing roles such as linking to community development). Meanwhile, for this theme, Bailie Kane and Laura will meet early in 2020 to discuss this issue further.

Learning for life and Work - Martin Wright and Connal Cochrane

Two outcomes and four priorities have been agreed. The priorities are – Volunteering; Learning; Employment/Employability and Processes with a dedicated action plan for each. Specific target groups are included such as young people, families and those who have been in the criminal justice system.

Successes:

- A major success is the number of partners that are involved with a regular attendance of up to 25 organisations at meetings that have been held six weekly. All have actively contributed to the content of the action plans.
- An early success is Govan Jobs Match initiative which was established and resourced under Govan Thriving Place in March 2019. This initiative has helped many people in Govan into jobs who may not otherwise have had the opportunity.
- Added value is brought through improved coordination and joint working across all
 three priorities and the allocation of additional resources where required (as in the
 case of Jobs Match). The audit of learning provision will evolve into a Govan
 directory of learning provision which will be accessible to learning providers (to
 improve joint working and minimise duplication) and learners who can more easily
 find out what is on and where.
- A recent success is a new partnership agreement between Glasgow Life and Govan High School which it is hoped can be extended to Bellahouston Academy. The partnership is open to all organisations and meets again on Wednesday 29th January, 9.30am at Govan High School. The aim of the partnership is to forward plan with Govan High to enhance the learning offer and aim to close the attainment gap. Digital access is a sub priority under learning. This dovetails with Scottish Government and Glasgow City Council digital strategies. A Govan Digital Forum is being created to map out and join up the use of digital resources (equipment and premises) improving access to and usage by organisations and residents in Govan.

Challenges:

- Reporting Framework for all thematic groups to the Steering Group format, frequency, measures of success against our action plans. We need clear guidance, timescales and methods of reporting.
- Having baseline information is important for measuring success, but having reliable baseline information for certain areas of activity may take some time or be unrealistic in some cases
- The scale of our theme is significant, which represents both and opportunity and a challenge. We need to be realistic and to focus upon where our work will bring added value.
- Communications both between members of the Thematic Group and across
 Thriving Places generally, as well as the outward facing communications with the
 residents Govan on existing opportunities and progress generally. A communications
 strategy may be beneficial for Govan Thriving Place in order to develop brand
 consistency, boost visibility across the area and in turn, engagement.

Children and Families: Neil McIntosh, NSPCC

Janet McCulloch, HSCP Head of Children's Services, is the new chair of the Together for Childhood Partnership which has extended its remit to coordinate the 'Supporting Children and Families' priority of the Govan Thriving Places Action Plan. The group has expanded its

membership to reflect Govan thriving place priorities and it now includes Home Start Glasgow South; Govan Help; Aberlour; and Govan Community Project

Successes:

- The Circle of Security parenting intervention pilot project was run in 5 cohorts and was so successful (with all participants from Glasgow City Mission engaging until the end of the programme and providing direct positive feedback) that it will now be offered universally to all parents in Govan.
- A partnership approach to people's rights are organising events for parents. 'Know Your Rights for Wee Govanights' focussed on income maximisation for families. Further themed events are planned.
- Scottish Mental Health First Aid; Young People is being delivered to Glasgow Life employees. It can be offered more widely if required
- Currently recruiting parents for a Parents Advisory group
- 'Picture this; a Govan Childhood' exhibition now being turned into a book launched in Feb 2020. The book will have a foreword from Sir Alex Ferguson and First Minister, Nicola Sturgeon

Challenges: a big challenge is the impact that universal credit is having on families and the predicted increase in child poverty. Trying to make sense of and dovetail with all the related children and families plans across Glasgow is also challenging.

Young People - Gary Maguire

The group meets monthly and has a core group of 16 partners. The plan has 25 specific actions over 8 outcomes and a tracker to measure impact – this is circulated to partners in advance of meetings to give them time to prepare an update. Co-production of services is the key ethos and the group has a brand.

Successes:

One of the successes is the upskilling of youth projects and organisations via training on:

- Street work
- Intro to youth work (delivered by Youth Scotland)
- Self-evaluation training following the HMiE inspection feedback
- Mental Health First Aid training

This was the first theme plan that was produced and agreed by the Steering Group - in May 2019 - so the group will start to think about an annual progress report

Challenges: our main challenge moving forward is funding as projects don't know what position they will be in come April 2020

Building Connections and Community Connector update – Yvonne Reilly provided this update post meeting

The Building Connections Group Action Plan has 2 objectives:

- to connect with the communities of Govan to ensure they are aware of Govan Thriving Places and how they can get involved: and
- to connect with organisations operating in or relevant to Govan, to ensure they are aware of Govan Thriving Place and how they can get involved.

The Community Connector and partners have begun the process of delivering on both the above objectives and an update is provided below:

- A pop up Thriving Places Stall is set up in the Govan Cross Shopping Centre once every 4 weeks with the purpose of engaging local residents on what Thriving Place is and what it aims to deliver, to feedback on the TP community consultations and to encourage involvement in the planned TP Community Event planned March 2020. Dates are also arranged for Ibrox and Elderpark Library in 2020
- Three Thriving Places Banners have been purchased; 1 has been placed in the main foyer of the Pearce Institute, 1 will be placed in Elderpark and Ibrox Libraries; and 1 will be used as a pop up
- The Govan Shopping Centre Manager has agreed to re-install the Community Information Notice Board in early 2020
- The Community Connector attended all Community Councils meetings in November/December 2019 to introduce the new Community Connector post and to welcome members to share ideas and suggestions
- Met with 33 organisations/partners including the Govan Reminiscence Group
 Linthouse Monday Group, to share information on Govan TP and develop links
- A Govan TP Community Event details later
- Initial scoping for establishing shop front premises in Govan, includes visits to East Renfrewshire Market Place shop fronts Barrhead & Newton Mearns Shopping Centre
- Early discussions to look at and application to Community Job Scotland with the purpose of employing a local resident to manage/design a TP Website Page, Jobs Match Website and Govan's Volunteer Bank Website.

Arts, Heritage & Wellbeing Theme Group

The Arts, Heritage & Wellbeing theme group was initially established to help coordinate, support and promote existing and new community events across the Govan Thriving Place area. The group is facilitated by Plantation Productions, building on their lead role in undertaking Govan Thriving Place community engagement (Govan Thriving Place Community Engagement Report, October 2017). In early 2019 the participating organisations agreed to rename the group the Arts, Heritage & Wellbeing Group, and become one of the seven themes identified under the Govan Thriving Place programme. To date, representatives of circa 30 organisations have attended meetings of the group

The group will:

- map organisations delivering arts and heritage activities in Govan to facilitate joint working;
- establish a calendar of community events, based on established annual events
 (e.g. The Govan Fair, Govan HA's Fun Day, CommuniT-in-the-Park and Govan
 Loves Christmas), supporting these and establishing new complementary events
 and activities, including the proposed new Govan Thriving Place Community
 Conference. Helping to secure resources for events on the calendar would
 become part of the role of the group and, in addition to the benefits of such a
 calendar of events for Govan, this should increase the opportunities to promote
 the wider Govan Thriving Place initiative and publicise and celebrate its
 successes.

Successes

- A new activity supported by Govan Thriving Place seedcorn funding, driven by Make Do & Grow is 'Govan Window Wanderland', a fun community event, centred on the creation of displays for street-facing windows throughout Central Govan, which will take place on Saturday 22nd February 2020.
- Another new activity is Mrs Elder's Glorious Gift project, sponsored through CGAP, and managed by Glasgow Buildings Preservation Trust, which comprises a range of creative activities to be rolled out in 2020 in association with the refurbishment of Elder Park's main gates and the K13 monument.

Challenges:

- key to the success of the Arts Heritage and Wellbeing Theme Group's plan is sustaining the established cornerstone organisations within Govan creative and heritage community. Applying for external funding to support these and other organisations under the Govan Thriving Place banner should be a strategic priority.
- future activity will need to involve a significant degree of cooperation on crosscutting issues and activities, including communications, marketing and community engagement.

Food for Good – John Casey

The group meets regularly and new voluntary sector organisations and community members have recently joined, so membership is expanding. 4 new venues have been identified as those running these venues are keen to become involved with this theme:

- Ibrox Parish Church
- Go Vegan Govan
- Gilded Lilly
- Clyde Community Hall

Successes:

- Training has been provided on Food Hygiene
- Planters have been installed that will be maintained by Moogety Gardens.
- Early discussions are underway on the 'Pantry' model and Alan Davidson (GCC DRS) will be invited to a meeting to take the group through the model. It is important that this develops bottom up rather than being imposed top down so it will take time to scope out and discuss the viability and relevance of this in Govan.
- Currently in discussions with Queen Elizabeth University Hospital about using their surplus food for community meals.
- Will explore links with Glasgow University re: Water Row
- A bid has been submitted to Glasgow Communities Fund to continue the work of the group. Await the decision on this application.
- The group is looking to deliver courses using existing and new venues across the Thriving Place, where local people can sign up to them in a venue as opposed to the courses being put on after people sign up. This is a new approach and will be evaluated to iron out any problems that may arise. If the Community Fund application is successful, this would be the way forward

John Casey is part of the city wide Community Food Thematic Group and will link up the Food for Good Action Plan with the city wide thematic groups and the Food Policy which is due to be launched in September 2020

Sub group of the Building Connections group has been established to plan the event

Purpose/principles: to create connections, be family and community engaging and focussed; encourage active participation in activities, conversations, workshops; showcase what is working & what is good in Govan now; provide an opportunity for the Steering Group and Thematic Groups to feedback to the community on progress and plans for 2020; and be accessible - provide transport and a crèche; ensure event is accessible for all.

Funding: a proposal is being drawn up to use some of the available thriving place funding

Group Discussion: agreed that national and local funders should be invited; and that theme leads/groups should consider creative/different ways of communicating about and engaging on their theme at the event (using artists, film, etc.) – a designated space for each theme will be allocated. Feedback from the Building Connections Group as to what is required of the theme groups would be helpful. Action:

Govan Thriving Place Participatory Budgeting Exercise 2020

Background

Community Budgeting (CB) is a generic term which covers a range of initiatives and approaches, and one of the most common approaches to CB is known as 'Participatory Budgeting'. Participatory budgeting is a democratic process in which community members decide how to spend part of a public budget and is described in the following terms:

"Participatory budgeting directly involves local people in making decisions on the spending priorities for a defined public budget. This means engaging residents and community groups representative of all parts of the community to discuss spending priorities, making specific proposals and vote on them, as well as giving local people a role in the scrutiny and monitoring process."

Govan has had 2 Community Budgeting processes in the recent past. Both of which were based on Area Partnership priorities and facilitated by the Partnership and Development Team.

The voting events in the Pearce Institute and Clyde Hall were well attended and were rated a success by all who attended.

Govan Participatory Budgeting 2020

The HSCP Heath Improvement Team has made £20,000 available for a Participatory Budgeting exercise for 2020 as part of its commitment to Thriving Places.

Rangers Charity Foundation have kindly agreed to hold and distribute the funding.

Community Groups and Third Sector Organisations operating in the Govan Thriving Place area will be invite to apply for up to £2000.

To be eligible, the application will need to address one, or more, of the Thriving Place Themes.

While the details have still to be firmed up, the basic idea is that the PB exercise will be part of the Community Event on 21st March.

Groups that make an eligible application will be asked to produce a poster of their proposal for the event.

At the event, participants will view the posters and they will vote for their chosen proposals using tokens. The successful projects will be those who receive the highest number of tokens.
