<p>DRC Generations</p> <p>Essential Maintenance: Response to COVID 19</p> <p>PRN 427/10</p>	<p>DRC Generations works in partnership with a range of service providers within North West Glasgow. The aim of the project is to improve health and wellbeing, promote awareness of addictions particularly alcohol and drugs, and provide education and training through mentoring, transition and support.</p> <p>Working in partnership with primary and secondary schools the project supports young people under 19 years of age to participate in a peer education, mentoring, transition and support model. The promotion of education and training skills supports participants to obtain paid employment.</p> <p>Funding is required for essential maintenance works to be undertaken within the office building to enable appropriate social distancing measures. It was identified that upgrading was required to replace two shutter doors and windows in 98 Kingsway which would also reduce costs for electricity as natural light would be sufficient during daylight hours. Electronic shutters are a safer option for staff and would complement the shutters at 102 Kingsway. <p>Men Matter Scotland  Men Matter Community Mini Bus  PRN: 608/19</p>	<p>Men Matter Scotland based in Drumchapel is a suicide prevention organisation providing peer support network for men. The organisation provides a safe non- judgmental space for men to talk about their problems, engage in positive activities and to take steps to a more hopeful future.</p> <p>Men Matter offer a wide range of activities and emotional support. The organisation has the service of volunteer cognitive behavioural therapists and four full time volunteers who dedicate their time to provide emotional and mental well-being support. This is achieved through 1:1 sessions and by offering a wide variety of activities including, breakfast clubs with healthy eating options and talking sessions, yoga classes, stress reduction classes, weekly outward bound excursions to various locations around Scotland, fitness classes within the internal gym. The Hub building consists of a large main area and 10 different sized room to accommodate a range of activities.</p> <p>Funding is requested to purchase a mini bus which will provide a financially viable way to offer more services as the organisation currently has to pay for transport costs. Transport is an issue for a lot of the Men Matter service users, making it difficult to access the Hub. The initiative will help parents cope with the impact of the COVID 19 Pandemic. The toolkit is delivered online to participants' homes and provides ways to manage stress, promote positive mental health and have a positive impact on children's lives.</p> <p>This nine week programme will be delivered to 32 parents who live in ward 13. Digital assistance will be supported by Gift Tech plus free internet access.</p> <p>Funding will support Parent Network Scotland to invest in the lives of parents enabling them to develop skills and networks.
