1. Welcome, Introductions and Apologies

The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting and apologies were given.

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2. Minute of Previous Meeting

No amendments requested were and the minute was approved.

3. Matters Arising

No matters were raised. Items 4 and 5 will be reversed on the agenda.

4. If Not Now, When? Social Renewal Advisory Board Report.

Paul (Tyrer) advised that he was the Head of the Secretariat that put together the report for the Board which was formed in June 2020 by Scottish Ministers to look at delivering change after the pandemic. Members of the Board include COSLA and Solace. He explained the background to the report, its 3 phases and the recommendations (framed as **Calls to Action**) made by the 9 policy groups. The report was published on 21st January.

- **Money and Work**

A minimum income guarantee (a long-term ambition with short term deliverables).
Fair work - enabling people hardest hit by the pandemic into quality jobs/careers and expansion of support for unemployed parents to get into work.

- **People, Rights and Advancing Equality**

This section focuses on prevention of inequality and promoting rights-based approaches. The pandemic has widened inequalities. There are ten Calls to Action focusing on housing, food, digital exclusion, human rights, inclusive communications, hate crime and migrant's rights. Tressa explained the challenges faced, which groups are affected and what's being done.

- **Communities and Collective Endeavour**

The report recognises that delivery of the Board's goals is down to money. It calls for more power to be devolved to communities and to front line teams (who have more expertise in solving problems) and a rebalancing of opportunities for 3rd Sector organisations.

- **Closing the Gap Between Promise and Practice**

How can the actions be taken forward – by hard conversations and consistent focus on equalities data to monitor progress and change. Also, by focussing on prevention and partnership and involving people in determining progress.

All questions or concerns raised were responded to or expanded on. Bernadette and the Chair will discuss which recommendations that Glasgow could benefit from.

The Chair thanked Paul and Tressa for their input.

Agreed Actions

- The Chair and Bernadette to discuss the recommendations in relation to Glasgow.

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5. Universal Credit in Glasgow; Third Working Paper from Policy Scotland

This is Sarah's third paper in the series and contains links to new research. The information was taken from November 2020 statistics on people on UC (Universal Credit) in Scotland.

Key Findings:

- Glasgow's caseload has seen an increase of 88% to around 71,000 cases.
- People are on UC for longer. 71% have been in receipt of UC for 6-24 months.
- In work crisis - there's been a 127% increase in people in work on UC.
- Conditionality – 44,000 are subject to this.
- Long-term impacts - most people receive about £300-£400 per month.
- Debt crisis – 60% of families have had to take out loans.

Demographic Groups and UC

- Gender – mostly males.
- Young People – the caseloads have doubled. Young people in further/higher education are not eligible for support.
- Disability – using conditionality, roughly 15,300 caseloads were identified but this figure is over-estimated when taking other factors in account.

Sarah identified a couple of reports by Salford University that she thought would be useful for the group. Both are on claimant experiences and local welfare report systems.

Impacts and Implications

- People will be living on persistent low incomes through 2021.
- There will be an increase in demand for welfare rights.
- The amount of UC payment will continue to be an issue.

The group discussed some of the findings and related issues from Sarah's presentation. Sarah gave advice on where to find further information.

The Chair thanked Sarah for her input and requested an update at a future meeting.

6. Mental Health Update

Fiona gave a presentation on her understanding of the mental health situation to date, what's been done so far and what the next steps will be. Fiona recognised that most of the members had been dealing with mental health in one way or another.

A lot of academic research literature on mental health shows that everything you would do to undermine mental health is what we've had to do during the pandemic – work has been taken away, income reduced, isolation, limited ability to make decisions or exercise. There's some key areas emerging around mental health with young adults. Many organisations have been looking at mental health in the community with GCVS hosting 2 events. Feedback from these is that as a city we won't recover socially or economically if we don't take mental health seriously.

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Fiona is working within the health board's recovery model around 5 key areas that will help in looking after people's mental health:

- to build resilience and maintain mental wellbeing
- address loneliness and isolation
- respond to trauma, distress and suicidality
- address underlying drivers of poor mental health
- support mental health and wellbeing of staff and volunteers

Significant changes in the Health Service includes the new Mental Health Assessment Units (MHAUs). More people are being referred through this service; presentations have almost doubled since the same period last year. Other sectors/programs helping to deal with mental health issues include Lifelink, GAMH, GCVS and the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline.

Although a lot is going on at all levels, there's no single partnership structure for looking at mental health in the city. The sectors/organisations recognised that a partnership which involved more partners in Glasgow, would enable them to come together to look at the different elements of work that's been going on. This will be called the Flourish Glasgow Partnership.

The Chair thanked Fiona for her presentation.

The group went onto discuss the presentation, raising related issues, asking questions and giving comments. The group was impressed by the breadth of work going on and agreed that a partnership would be a positive mechanism.

7. Workstreams – Reporting Template

John compared the components of the template to the components of a TV guide for simplification:

- the workstream overview being a quick guide
- the flash reports as the marketing component
- flicking/picking of channels/programs. John stressed the need for all to spend time each month with Matthew to ensure the content is highlighted to help the Chair decide whose "channel" we should be tuning into for the next report – who do we need to engage with in terms of key events/activity/components. This will also highlight areas that need to be looked at closer

John advised that the flash reports could be made an app if wanted.

From next month, a copy will be issued before the meetings. The Chair directed that the workstream updates be moved up the agenda to give people the opportunity to ask questions. As the aim of the SRT is action focused, this will allow the members to work through any issues as a team. John added that the benefit of the flash reports is that they indicate where help is needed.

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Questions/comments were raised in connection to the 10 questions in terms of focus, infrastructure and finding the time to complete the content. It was advised that the 10 questions were set out as a framework to get focussed on what the key priorities were and how we evidence it. In relation to performance management measures, Bernadette suggested bringing this as an item to a future SRT meeting and would take it off table to discuss with Shaw and Gerald. One of the main benefits of the template is that it gives clarity in terms of understanding of the roles and ownership.

It was agreed that the template and the workstream updates should be moved up the agenda.

8. Workstream Updates - Roundtable

As the meeting ran over time, the Chair asked if the members wanted to remain to discuss the updates or to take them off table for discussion – the members chose the latter option.

- 1. LOCAL KNOWLEDGE:** How can local knowledge and experience be communicated to policy makers at national level in ways that genuinely inform and improve decision making?
- 2. GLASGOW'S NEEDS:** How can the Council and its partners better evidence the complex, multiple nature of needs that services in the city of Glasgow are responding to, and more effectively make the case for increased resources and/or support to the city from the Scottish and UK governments that takes account of the higher level of need?
- 3. OTHER PARTNERSHIPS:** What robust (i.e. non-anecdotal) evidence do we have about local partnerships that have worked well, enabling voluntary sector, Council and other partners to respond quickly and effectively to the challenges posed by the pandemic? Conversely, what evidence do we have about things that have not worked so well? Evidence in this context might take the form of short case studies, especially if they highlight the complexity of need, challenges and opportunities within partnership working and show what can be done when the right conditions are created or illustrate some of the barriers to effectiveness.
- 4. LOCKDOWN EXPERIENCE:** What worked well during the lockdown period and its aftermath in identifying and addressing need? Are the mechanisms involved in the initial emergency response e.g. methods of funding or ways of collaborative working, being adopted or modified in the light of experience? How are partner organisations and the Council learning from experience?
- 5. BEST FIRST MOVES:** Given that we face a combined health and jobs crisis, what are the (small number) of best first moves that the partners (not just the Council) should be taking?
- 6. WHY THOSE MOVES:** Given limited resource and competing priorities, why are these (the recommended best first moves) the most appropriate steps to take now?
- 7. MEASURING SUCCESS:** How would your work stream define and measure success? What evidence is there (or will there be by next July) that the steps recommended and taken will be (or have been) the most impactful and that other options would have (had) less impact?
- 8. CITY PRIORITIES:** How would success measures relate to the city's priorities? What evidence is there (or will there be by next July) that steps being taken now or proposed by the social recovery partners will contribute towards key shared objectives including addressing poverty, making progress on equalities, tackling climate change and delivering inclusive growth?
- 9. IMPROVE COLLABORATION:** Are there other actions proposed or that should be considered that would help improve collaboration between the social recovery partners and/or lead to enhanced future community engagement?
- 10. REQUIRED SYSTEM CHANGES:** Are system changes required in the relationship between the Council and voluntary sector partners to reduce duplication and lead to greater transparency in determining how resources should be distributed between place, interest and identity priorities? The working groups are asked to consider a range of options including the possibility of moving to a commissioning system for service delivery rather than the bidding and scoring system used for the Communities.
