1. Welcome, Introductions and Apologies

The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting and apologies were given.

2. Minute of Previous Meeting

No amendments requested. The minute was approved.

3. Matters Arising

No matters were raised.

4. Community Engagement

Judith advised that her report won't now be ready until the end of the month.

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She went on to give a presentation on the findings and recommendations of the project, giving background detail for anyone new to the meeting. The project team consisted of Judith (and some of her team) and representatives from Glasgow Life, Glasgow Kelvin College, HSCP, GCPH and four community connectors from Thriving Places. Judith explained that:

- of the 400 people on the shielding list who had agreed to be contacted, 221 calls were carried out and 21 interviews were held with young people
- of the non-completed calls, people had died/were ill, no longer wanted to participate or couldn't be contacted
- data received was broken down by age, gender, mental/physical health and ethnicity
- key themes coming out were around loneliness, isolation/privacy, mental health, digital exclusion, finances, food access and fears for the future. Judith added that more thought is needed as to how financial support is provided

Judith showed quotations made by young people on their experiences during the pandemic, the affect it has had on them, how they feel about it and how they feel about going forward. She then showed quotations made by adults about their experiences, how it affected their mental health, their work and life. Some people spoke of the positives they've taken from it and practical suggestions they feel could help.

One of the challenges to the project was the impact it had on the staff as they were dealing with some difficult and emotional calls whilst dealing with the same mental health issues as everyone else. Judith commented on the new way of partnership working – different organisations delivering the same things together.

Judith proposed that the data gathered be used to co-produce recommendations made by the taskforces with the communities about the type of support and actions required - the pandemic has emphasised the need for decisions to be made by the people about what affects them. Judith suggested that a process of dialogue and deliberation is followed. Her ask of the SRTF is that it will:

- explore the key themes and findings with the communities
- listen to and understand the reasons for the types of support needed for social recovery
- accept the recommendations, commit to actions, allocate resources and make better use of existing structures and funding

Judith noted that all the work had been done with no additional resources and that small pots of resources could enable other organisations to do it.

The Chair thanked Judith for her interesting presentation - although there were no huge surprises in the findings, he thought it powerful to hear the contributions of other voices. The Chair talked of the issues we'll face on moving out of lockdown, how we'll deal with them and the consequences.

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The group discussed how Judith's work overlaps with other workstreams and gave comments. On the matter of dialog and deliberation, it was questioned how the processes might work. Judith stressed the need for willingness from the service provider to have an open and honest discussion and suggested that maybe we should be more accountable for what we deliver. Peer support and capacity building is also needed to make sure people's voices are heard. It was noted that the Community Empowerment Act was not being used to its full extent.

HSCP have been looking at developing a Citizens Panel and have had some discussion around it in relation to the maximising independence agenda. No decision has been made on it yet.

The Chair concluded that there was a lot of questions to think about in relation to improving engagement with the people of Glasgow. Once Judith's report is concluded the SRT will look at how it can be directed through the workstreams.

5. Workstream Updates

This was the first time that the members were able to go through all the workstreams. John asked that they highlight anything key across partners and give key messages or asks.

Mental Health (Public Health Oversight Board)

Fiona explained that she had given an update at the last SRT. The GCPHOB met this week and it was agreed to move forward to convene the Flourishing Glasgow Partnership. Fiona will move forward to invite people. The Socially Connected Glasgow side of the work will take longer.

Technology and Digital (Digital Glasgow Board)

No representative was in attendance.

Fiona advised that the Digital Inclusion workstream had met for the first time this morning and the next steps were discussed.

Third Sector (GCVS)

Ian advised that the group is progressing well and have had their 5th meeting. He had one ask in relation to the group of 3rd sector organisations that meet - the timelines will be squeezed if the challenge isn't addressed. Ian had applied too late for Matt to change the joint review to amber before the papers went out. He stressed the need to establish the joint group of public and 3rd sector organisations to start looking at the recommendations in-depth, noting that it was a strong ask to the public sector colleagues.

Gary questioned if there was HSCP representation. Ian was unsure but advised the matter was being taken to the Council Management Team. Bernadette will discuss this with Ann-Marie and raise it at the next Council Management Team meeting on 30th April.

Black and Minority Ethnic Communities (GCC BME Taskforce Group)

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Jatin had nothing to add as it is still early days. He's met with around 20 groups and will take forward the information passed to him.

Disabled Communities (Glasgow Disability Alliance)

Not updated version shown. Tressa advised that the output from their previous meeting had been reviewed and a series of planning meetings have been held. The model being looked at is to produce a series of briefings, co-designing the recommendations that the task force needs using participatory methods, with actions and ways to measure progress.

Food Provision (Glasgow Food Policy Partnership/Glasgow Community Food Network)

No representative was in attendance. No input given.

Violence Against Women (Violence Against Women Partnership)

Ann advised that a couple of working groups have been set up. Family support for "Making a House a Home" are working with Financial Services and this will go live in April.

The National Training Tool is now on GCC Gold.

Ann is working on taking the 10 questions to the next partnership meeting and will come back with more clarity on their status.

Volunteering (Volunteering Strategy Governance Group)

Ian advised that an in-depth update was given at the last meeting.

Child Poverty (Child Poverty Governance Board)

Fiona advised that the Local Child Poverty Annual Report had been published and work has started on the next.

The Winter Social Protection Funding payments that went through HSCPs have been made to over 1400 children and families.

Young People/Transitions (Colleges/Skills Development Scotland)

A report is due out in April.

Property (Making Best Use of Our Assets: Property Group)

No representative was in attendance. No input given.

It was asked if the information could be made available before the meeting as it would help give more meaningful feedback. Ian found that the template had made him aware of how disconnected he'd become from some of the other groups and thought it'd be useful if more detailed updates were provided. It was agreed that every workstream should have a representative at the table or a written submission provided - Shaw, John and Bernadette will pick up on this.

It was proposed that Digital Inclusion be put on the next (or future agenda) along with a presentation by Cormac (Quinn) on the work being done on producing the new equality outcomes that could be embedded in the workstreams.

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Dawn was concerned that there is still no women's workstream and asked that this is noted in the minutes, stating the need to get things moving. Bernadette will pick up on this with Cllr Layden and touch base off table with Dawn.

Given that priorities will change as the pandemic does, Fiona asked if what we're doing still adds up to our social recovery – does it still represent the whole picture. John and Shaw will discuss this.

One of the recommendations made by the Social Renewal Advisory Board was to go through their report and strip out what recommendations are applicable to Glasgow. Tressa thought this a useful exercise and asked if it was something the Academic Advisory Group could do.

Agreed Actions

- Fiona to invite people into the Flourishing Glasgow Partnership.
- Shaw, John and Bernadette to look at workstream representation or written submissions at future meetings.
- Bernadette to speak with Cllr Layden and Dawn about a women's workstream.
- John and Shaw to look at the SRT priorities – do they still represent the whole picture.
- The Academic Advisory Group to look at the Social Renewal Advisory Board report in relation to the recommendations applicable to Glasgow.

- 1. LOCAL KNOWLEDGE:** How can local knowledge and experience be communicated to policy makers at national level in ways that genuinely inform and improve decision making?
- 2. GLASGOW'S NEEDS:** How can the Council and its partners better evidence the complex, multiple nature of needs that services in the city of Glasgow are responding to, and more effectively make the case for increased resources and/or support to the city from the Scottish and UK governments that takes account of the higher level of need?
- 3. OTHER PARTNERSHIPS:** What robust (i.e. non-anecdotal) evidence do we have about local partnerships that have worked well, enabling voluntary sector, Council and other partners to respond quickly and effectively to the challenges posed by the pandemic? Conversely, what evidence do we have about things that have not worked so well? Evidence in this context might take the form of short case studies, especially if they highlight the complexity of need, challenges and opportunities within partnership working and show what can be done when the right conditions are created or illustrate some of the barriers to effectiveness.
- 4. LOCKDOWN EXPERIENCE:** What worked well during the lockdown period and its aftermath in identifying and addressing need? Are the mechanisms involved in the initial emergency response e.g. methods of funding or ways of collaborative working, being adopted or modified in the light of experience? How are partner organisations and the Council learning from experience?
- 5. BEST FIRST MOVES:** Given that we face a combined health and jobs crisis, what are the (small number) of best first moves that the partners (not just the Council) should be taking?
- 6. WHY THOSE MOVES:** Given limited resource and competing priorities, why are these (the recommended best first moves) the most appropriate steps to take now?
- 7. MEASURING SUCCESS:** How would your work stream define and measure success? What evidence is there (or will there be by next July) that the steps recommended and taken will be (or have been) the most impactful and that other options would have (had) less impact?
- 8. CITY PRIORITIES:** How would success measures relate to the city's priorities? What evidence is there (or will there be by next July) that steps being taken now or proposed by the social recovery partners will contribute towards key shared objectives including addressing poverty, making progress on equalities, tackling climate change and delivering inclusive growth?
- 9. IMPROVE COLLABORATION:** Are there other actions proposed or that should be considered that would help improve collaboration between the social recovery partners and/or lead to enhanced future community engagement?
- 10. REQUIRED SYSTEM CHANGES:** Are system changes required in the relationship between the Council and voluntary sector partners to reduce duplication and lead to greater transparency in determining how resources should be distributed between place, interest and identity priorities? The working groups are asked to consider a range of options including the possibility of moving to a commissioning system for service delivery rather than the bidding and scoring system used for the Communities.

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
