1. Welcome, Introductions and Apologies

The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting and apologies were given.

2. Minute of Previous Meeting

No amendments were requested, and the minute was approved.

3. Academic Advisory Group Proposal

Des explained the background of the AAG, the contributions it has made and the research/ expertise it has brought to the SRT. The purpose of his paper is for the partnerships to consider continuing with the group once the SRT comes to an end. Des saw opportunities to

build on its work and thought it important to mention the way in which the AAG sought to work with the communities themselves through the microbriefings (giving the groups some ownership and involvement).

Some discussions have already taken place and the consensus is to retain it. Cllr Bell felt that the AAG had been an immense help and would welcome continuing with it. Pete thought the AAG 's input had been a strong example of local authorities utilising the evidence base.

4. Community Engagement Project

Judith gave a brief introduction to the project. She explained that, just now, the focus is not about the issues in the report but about how we take forward the broad spectrum of community engagement and how we develop practice that takes it into the work we're doing.

Prior to breaking into discussion groups, Judith gave a quotation from page 5 of her report and asked people to think about it. On return, each of the facilitators gave a quick feedback of their discussions.

Jonny Pickering noted a strong community engagement in relation to violence against women work. Front line services feedback evidence which helps form service development – evidence comes from service user groups which includes a lot of lived experience. The shift towards online platforms is challenging, as it makes it more difficult to engage. It was agreed that further research is required on issues such as people being moved into homeless accommodation and volunteering. Also, more evidence/information is needed as to how services have been affected by COVID. To put the recommendations into practise, there's a need to identify the resources that can engage meaningfully.

Lawrence O'Neill related the discussion around the issues of the report in relation to young people and mental health and how it can be addressed in going forward. In reference to Judith's earlier quotation, Lawrence reported that a lot of good work had been done with the workstreams that were already in place and the new groups that were formed. There was criticism around the Council's engagement with a "favoured few" in the 3rd Sector. The group felt there was a need to move forward with conversations around community engagement and co-production, as well as the expectations of the community.

Cat Tabbner gave examples of how workstreams have been engaging - the volunteering workstream identified areas where it could engage more, and a Thriving Places co-ordinator carried out work with communities and housing. The learning that came out of this was to use existing channels so that people/groups were not being asked the same question by different people. It was thought that consultations should be used in ways that start with an offer so that communities can see what is available in order to make an informed decision about engaging. In terms of how to take the recommendations into practice, co-production is seen as the biggest challenge but also as the biggest opportunity for the public sector to work with communities.

Maureen Wilbraham spoke of engagement around child poverty and mental health, with some organisations focussing on working with parents to take this issue forward. Kelvin College and community partners carried out work designing course contents to meet the needs of the users. Kelvin College also carried out work with young people on the streets to find out what it is they need. More time is needed to develop their practises and re-establish the skillset people had before COVID. A framework should be designed around engagement and research, with more time dedicated to research in order to identify the route of the problem.

Judith's feedback covered some of the issues already mentioned - child poverty and mental health. Judith gave the Glasgow Disability Alliance (who have service users sitting on the

workstream group) as a model - they have co-design processes which have been developed by engaging with disabled people As a lot of people have suffered from low level mental health (such as anxiety) and aren't accessing medical services, it was suggested a support service be shaped around them.

Judith felt that there has been a shift in society toward inequalities. She saw the shift towards a co-production type of practice as (quoting Cat) our greatest challenge and opportunity.

Cllr Bell described Judith's report as powerful and opened the meeting up for questions/ comments. Comments on the report were extremely positive and suggestions were made. Bernadette asked that today's discussions be captured. Given that the SRT will finish in December, Bernadette assumed that its work would continue as part of Community Planning. She stated the need to capture what has come out of the individual workstreams and look at how we build community engagement into it. She was keen to have lived experience embedded in a routine way. Cllr Bell asked that this item be kept on the agenda and for an update to be provided at the next meeting.

After further discussion on how work can be taken forward, Judith proposed sending out a sheet for people to record the work they have done so far and what they can commit to. Judith and Bernadette will return at a future meeting with a further update on what's being done and how it can be taken forward through pilots. Tressa offered to help with ideas or information when the papers are being put together. Dougie is about to start a piece of community engagement work on the operation of a small service in Drumchapel and thought to use it to create a simple process that will help measure community engagement against Judith's definition of co-production. Bernadette, Judith, colleagues and partners will discuss offline a report on the next steps of the work.

Cllr Bell thanked Judith and her colleagues for their input.

5. Workstream Updates

John invited each of the workstream leaders to give an update.

Disabled Communities (Glasgow Disability Alliance)

The Poverty and Work Event held in May is currently being analysed. A workstream meeting was held in June where evidence was considered, recommendations discussed, and conversations held with key officers about co-designing the next event which is a Health & Social Care Event planned for September.

Third Sector (GCVS)

The 3rd Sector draft report was published this week and will go to WECCE for feedback. Feedback is being sought from both the public and 3rd Sector. There are a lot of recommendations within the report with people having contributed a huge amount of time to it. It contains a lot of positives and good learning. There will be a

revised version of the report in going forward.

Violence Against Women (Violence Against Women Partnership)

The partnership is currently finalising their response to the 10 questions. They are looking at doing an impact assessment on COVID to help inform and develop their strategic plan.

The Family Support Project are doing a quarterly report on how it has been implemented.

Distribution of the online scoping exercise on prostitution report has been delayed until October. Kirsti stated that she was keen to come to the SRT to give input on what they learned about prostitution in the city during COVID.

Volunteering (Volunteering Strategy Governance Group)

David Maxwell reported that the priority just now is strengthening the governance structure for the volunteering strategy and will meet soon to discuss this with Cllr Layden and Bernadette. Another priority is to take forward a short-term working group to look at language, messaging and marketing of volunteering.

Property (Making Best Use of Our Assets: Property Group)

There have been over 300 Expressions of Interest received in People Make Glasgow Communities. More staff have been taken on, been trained and are ready to take on some of the proposals from the community groups. Processes are still being developed and learning from feedback being looked at. Interim arrangements have been made with Glasgow Life to look at interim arrangements to get people to deliver services/amenities locally without long term commitment.

Food Provision (Glasgow Food Policy Partnership/Glasgow Community Food Network)

Louise reported that the Glasgow Food Plan has been approved and a launch event was held in June.

Work will continue on the priorities of the plan with thematic groups.

The Glasgow Food Policy Partnership is being refreshed to align the membership more to the delivery of the food plan.

• Women's Workstream

The 1st meeting of the workstream was held last week and is working towards a learning event to be held later in the year. Information provided by Chris Harkins helped with the priorities to take forward. Representatives from NRS, Wise Women, Glasgow Women's Voluntary Sector Network, the Simon Community, the Glasgow Violence Against Women Partnership and a researcher from the University of Glasgow were in attendance. The membership will be expanded to include other organisations. The group will meet monthly with agenda planning set for future meetings.

John thanked all for their input.

6. Community Action Plan (CAP)

John explained where he is with the plan, where it connects with a lot of the issues that were raised today and how it links into what Judith is doing. John gave a presentation on the strategy of the Community Plan, the delivery of the Action Plan, how the SRT was set up as a response to COVID and how the needs and wants of the community are captured. John went onto give a step-by-step delivery of the plan.

- Alignment of the performance framework with the CAP and the actions from the SRTF.
- Sign off and publish the aligned CAP.
- Flash reports will be updated in a way that it links back into the CAP.
- Identify where our community needs and wants sit.
- Define any additional approaches on engagement around place and co-production.
- Potential future options.

John hopes to have the CAP publicly available by the end of September.

PAST 4-WEEKS

- PMO resources are now in place and are starting to work through PMGC enquiries.
- Over 300 enquiries have been received via the online portal by interested parties.
- Initial responses continue to be issued and initial assessment of individual EOIs is progressing. Engagement with Glasgow Life and other Service Areas ongoing regarding individual EOIs to gather information on individual venues.

4-WEEK VIEW

 10no detailed proposals have been submitted. These EOIs have now progressed to the Engagement Stage.

NEXT 4-WEEKS

- Recruitment of one further Programme
 Liaison Officer to complete the PMO team.
- Respond to EOIs and analyse each enquiry including engagement with those currently managing/delivering services from the assets.
- Asset suitability assessments to be undertaken with Glasgow Life and GCC
 Service Areas to understand suitability of each individual asset for the PMGC process.
- EOI and venue information gathering.
- Working groups to be formed to support organisations that have submitted detailed proposals for the engagement phase.

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TEN QUESTIONS | SOCIAL RECOVERY TASK FORCE



- 1. LOCAL KNOWLEDGE: How can local knowledge and experience be communicated to policy makers at national level in ways that genuinely inform and improve decision making?
- 2. GLASGOW'S NEEDS: How can the Council and its partners better evidence the complex, multiple nature of needs that services in the city of Glasgow are responding to, and more effectively make the case for increased resources and/or support to the city from the Scottish and UK governments that takes account of the higher level of need?
- 3. OTHER PARTNERSHIPS: What robust (i.e. non-anecdotal) evidence do we have about local partnerships that have worked well, enabling voluntary sector, Council and other partners to respond quickly and effectively to the challenges posed by the pandemic? Conversely, what evidence do we have about things that have not worked so well? Evidence in this context might take the form of short case studies, especially if they highlight the complexity of need, challenges and opportunities within partnership working and show what can be done when the right conditions are created or illustrate some of the barriers to effectiveness.

- 4. LOCKDOWN EXPERIENCE: What worked well during the lockdown period and its aftermath in identifying and addressing need? Are the mechanisms involved in the initial emergency response e.g. methods of funding or ways of collaborative working, being adopted or modified in the light of experience? How are partner organisations and the Council learning from experience?
- 5. BEST FIRST MOVES: Given that we face a combined health and jobs crisis, what are the (small number) of best first moves that the partners (not just the Council) should be taking?
- 6. WHY THOSE MOVES: Given limited resource and competing priorities, why are these (the recommended best first moves) the most appropriate steps to take now?
- 7. MEASURING SUCCESS: How would your work stream define and measure success? What evidence is there (or will there be by next July) that the steps recommended and taken will be (or have been) the most impactful and that other options would have (had) less impact?

- 8. CITY PRIORITIES: How would success measures relate to the city's priorities? What evidence is there (or will there be by next July) that steps being taken now or proposed by the social recovery partners will contribute towards key shared objectives including addressing poverty, making progress on equalities, tackling climate change and delivering inclusive growth?
- 9. IMPROVE COLLABORATION: Are there other actions proposed or that should be considered that would help improve collaboration between the social recovery partners and/or lead to enhanced future community engagement?
- system changes required in the relationship between the Council and voluntary sector partners to reduce duplication and lead to greater transparency in determining how resources should be distributed between place, interest and identity priorities? The working groups are asked to consider a range of options including the possibility of moving to a commissioning system for service delivery rather than the bidding and scoring system used for the Communities.



PUBLIC HEALTH DELIVERY PLAN | OBJECTIVES

- Establish a clearer understanding of what public health partners most need from policing
- Confirm priority areas of focus and consult subject matter experts to enhance prevention / intervention activity
- 3. Equip officers and staff with greater awareness of the policing role in improving public health
- Optimise opportunities to support in circumstances where police officers are uniquely placed
- Pursue opportunities to share data to enable a joint evidence base for addressing root causes of poor health outcomes
- Enhance Prevention policing approaches to help address underlying causes of poor health outcomes
- 7. Explore deeper collaboration with partners to shape a longer term population focus
- 8. Ensure appropriate representation at partnership forums & Police Scotland meetings




Policing principles
